











### **Bringing People Into East Midtown**

As New York City continues to emerge from the worst of the pandemic, it has been apparent that the public craves activities and events again. We were happy to deliver. Here are a few of our highlights from 2022-2023:



### **Trick-or-Treating Drew Thousands in October**

It is safe to say that "Trick-or-Treat with East Midtown" has made a quick recovery from the pandemic. In 2022 and 2023, our signature Halloween event brought more than 5,000 people to the district, where they enjoyed pumpkin painting, a photo booth, arts and crafts, and trick-or-treating at almost 100 local businesses.

There's nothing quite like seeing the smiles on the faces of our community's young people (and their adult escorts), not to mention the cute costumes, as they parade through the streets of our district. Our thanks to all the participating businesses for welcoming these little ghosts and goblins across their thresholds and providing treats, and special thanks to our host sites: SL Green's 919 Third Avenue and Sunrise at East 56th, 139 East 56th Street.

This event won an award several years ago from the International Downtown Association, which especially liked how it was an easy program for any community to replicate. We agree, of course, but there's also something very special about Halloween in East Midtown Manhattan that no one will ever be able to replicate.









### **Celebrating World Poetry Day in March**

For World Poetry Day on March 20, we partnered with the 58th Street Branch of the New York Public Library and brought nine poets to the district for an afternoon of poetry reading. The event featured established poets like David Groff and Carol Rosenfeld, as well as up-and-comers, some of whom are students in the Creative Writing program at The New School.

### **Introducing an Easter Egg Hunt in April**

Some of our favorite events are family-friendly (can we mention Halloween again?), so in 2023 we decided to add an Easter Egg Hunt to the calendar. To gauge public interest, we started small and hid eggs at 20 participating businesses in the week leading up to Easter. Families with young children responded so positively and enthusiastically to this programming we had to replenish our supply of plastic eggs several times!

Everyone who found an egg (which really means everyone who participated) received candy, and those who found the golden egg hidden at each establishment won gift certificates to Learning Express Toys (for the kids) and a local restaurant (for the adults.) We got great feedback, so expect the program to return on a larger scale in 2024.









### A Second Season of "An East Midtown Minute" Goes Behind the Scenes

"An East Midtown Minute" was formally launched in June 2022. Hosted by Betsy Bober Polivy of Manhattan Sideways and filmed and edited by Michael Corcoran of Bizi Media, this series of short video reels gave thousands of viewers an insider's look at the people and history behind unique East Midtown venues and small businesses. ### April Showers? No Problem. We Moved Sculpture Day to Summer Streets

Part of being a problem-solver is to not be too much of a slave to the calendar.

In April 2022, we partnered with our friends from the Grand Central Partnership, Fund for Park Avenue, NYC Parks Department, and others to celebrate International Sculpture Day on Park Avenue. We had plans to repeat the event on the last Saturday of April 2023... but Mother Nature had other ideas.

We were rained out in April, but unbowed in our joint commitment to celebrate the Sophia Vari, Willie Cole, and Raul Mourão artwork that adorned the Park Avenue malls between East 53rd Street and East 70th Street. And we knew just how to maximize our exposure.

Since 2008, Summer Streets has closed Park Avenue to vehicular traffic during three consecutive Saturday mornings in August, allowing the public to use the thoroughfare to walk, run, and bike. We've always enjoyed Summer Streets as participants, but this year we signed up for a table at the 51st Street Rest Stop and promoted the sculptures, helping thousands of people during those three Saturdays learn more about the art and the artists – not to mention our respective organizations – through handouts and a self-guided tour. In the end, those April showers probably did us a favor, helping us reach people we never would have reached without the popularity of Summer Streets.



### "East Midtown Pride" Hit a High Note in June

We started June 2023 on a high note as the a cappella group Tonewall, part of the NYC Gay Men's Chorus, ushered in East Midtown Pride by serenading a VIP crowd of more than 100 people during our kick-off reception at SUNY Global Center. Among the attendees were SUNY Chancellor John B. King, Jr.; Ron Zacchi, the New York State Director of LGBTQ+ Affairs, who presented a proclamation on behalf of Governor Kathy Hochul; Patrick Kwan, representing Mayor Eric Adams; and Deputy Manhattan Borough President Keisha Sutton-James,



representing Borough President Mark Levine.

For the rest of the month, that high note continued unabated. In mid-June, we once again hosted a panel discussion followed by a reception on the Rooftop Terrace at the SUNY Global Center to welcome our friends from the National Gay & Lesbian Chamber of Commerce and members of the local LGBTQ business community. And nine times throughout the month we partnered with The Publishing Triangle and the Society of Illustrators, Bloom's Tavern, and SUNY Global to offer readings by

more than 40 top LGBTQ+ writers, including James Earl Hardy, Eric Orner, Emanuel Xavier, Ryka Aoki, and Mecca Jamilah Sullivan. We

also promoted 59E59 Theaters' productions of Orlando and Foxes.

To recognize that Pride is more than a celebration, we were also honored to display seven panels from the AIDS Memorial Quilt at six venues across the district throughout June. These quilt panels signify the deeper meaning of LGBTQ+ Pride, and we thank the following venues for hosting them:

It was a month to remember, capped by an amazing concert by the NYC Gay Men's Chorus to observe Juneteenth. "Black and Queer," which brought hundreds of people to Park Avenue's Christ Church, put the spotlight on a number of Black chorus members, and left the audience profoundly moved by the experience. The concert was the perfect way to simultaneously celebrate Pride and Juneteenth.

### **CLEANLINESS, SAFETY, AND GREENERY**

### **Creating A Welcoming Environment**

Keeping our streets safe, clean, and green is our number one priority. A community that is unattractive and feels unsafe is an unwelcoming community... and that's not us.



### **Clean Patrol Tackles the Dirty Work**

The East Midtown Partnership Clean Patrol, contracted through The Doe Fund since 2002, sweeps sidewalks, shovels snow, empties trash and recycling receptacles (and hauls away the bags), removes graffiti, disinfects street furniture, and much more, and they're out there 365 days a year. Thanks to their efforts, each year we remove more than one million pounds of trash from district streets.

The Doe Fund's Ready, Willing & Able program is widely acclaimed for its success in breaking negative cycles and instilling in its trainees a strong work ethic. These dedicated people – most of whom have been incarcerated and many who have combatted substance abuse – want to reclaim their lives, and The Doe Fund is there to help them. Since 2002, more than 1,000 East Midtown Clean Patrol trainees have successfully transitioned into full-time private sector employment at a living wage, and many of them are now working for private sector employers here in East Midtown Manhattan.

We were also the first Business Improvement District in New York City to launch a sidewalk paper recycling program. With 120 customdesigned recycling containers throughout the district, pedestrians are always near an environmentally friendly way to remove newspapers and other paper items from the waste stream. What's good for our community's cleanliness is also good for the environment.

## East Midtown Security Provided Community Safety and Information

Few people know East Midtown as well as our security patrol team. These men and women give directions and guidance, report on unsafe traffic conditions, respond to merchant concerns and illegal vending situations, and provide a reassuring presence to the public during normal business hours. They are also on hand to inform local businesses of important information about health, safety, and the economic recovery, as well as East Midtown Partnership programming, information from the NYPD, and other items of interest.

Under the leadership of supervisor Mark Galon, the security team is on the streets six days a week. Many of the members of this team have been with us for more than a decade, and a few have been walking the streets of East Midtown since we began the security patrol in June 2002.



### We Continued to Offer Services to the East Side's Homeless Population

Homelessness is not an issue unique to New York City, or even to the United States, but we've taken a leadership role in this City by making sure homeless individuals have access to a helping hand to get off the streets. For two decades we've contracted with BRC to provide homeless outreach services in the district and adjacent areas of our community to provide a path to rehabilitation, shelter, and recovery for the vulnerable men and women on our streets. This year, with more comprehensive reporting by BRC requested by the Board of Directors, we are tracking the area's homeless population in greater depth than ever before.

## Seasonal Plantings: A Problem, and a Problem Solved

We believe an attractive streetscape makes East Midtown an attractive place to work, live, shop, dine, and play, which is why we've been proud of our tree bed planting program. Started fifteen years ago with a few pilot beds, today almost 200 tree beds in the district – many formerly weedy and poorly maintained – receive three seasonal flower plantings each year... at no cost to the adjacent business or property owner.

But as we emerged from the pandemic, a few new problems became apparent. The dramatic increase in home and office deliveries brought with it a dramatic increase in curbside package sorting, and many of our plantings were being crushed under boxes, or under the feet of delivery personnel. Additionally, pigeons and other birds had discovered that some of our flowers were delicious. And then there were inconsiderate pet owners...

As a result, a program designed to make our streets more attractive was making many of them look shabby. Since planting 200 tree beds is not an inexpensive proposition, it was clear we needed to either find a creative solution or end the program.

By being creative, we found a solution. Our horticultural team from the Landsite Group installed simple wooden stakes wrapped with reflective bird tape around planting beds that were unprotected by tree guards, which saved our plants... and our planting program, The tape was a deterrent to birds, and the stakes and tape further delineated the tree beds, keeping both delivery people and dogs on the pavement where they belong. With the problem solved, our plants and flowers once again flourished.



### Planters Add Color to Lexington and Third Avenues

Over the years, the NYC Department of Transportation has sought to calm vehicular traffic and increase pedestrian space and safety by eliminating traffic lanes on some local streets, including Lexington Avenue and Third Avenue. To further increase safety and add some color to the streetscape, we have installed several dozen planters in this reclaimed space, which has been warmly received by the local community.

### **Getting Proactive on Extermination**

It's not a secret that New York City has a ballooning rodent problem. Unfortunately, too often, it is addressed building by building and rodents don't care about property lines so individual extermination efforts have minimal impact.

That's why over the past year the East Midtown Partnership has aggressively taken on rodent activity in the district's public spaces. For years we've had great success dealing with concerns at Tramway Plaza, decreasing the number of active burrows in the planting beds from 27 to zero before the state took over the park for construction. We're now back in Tramway Plaza, once again getting it in order, and have begun extermination in other burrows we find in tree beds and along sidewalks throughout the district. Combined with efforts by the NYC Department of Sanitation, we look forward to beating back this citywide problem.
